In the fall watching our kids parade and proudly perform on stage at a music therapy benefit; witnessing the magic of proud kids and parents at our first live in person Christmas concert since COVID; watching collaborations with the Vancouver Welshman's Choir; hearing small groups perform at John Fluevog's Gastown store open house; and finally culminating in our year-end family and combined spring concerts featuring choirs, graduates, ensembles, soloists and our signature String program.

Even with our first Post-Covid term behind us, last year we learned that adjusting to life 'back to normal' is a process of development that simply can't be hurried.

As families and individuals have endeavored to return to 'normal' post-Covid, the ability to bounce back to the previous pace of life has not been straightforward for many children, nor indeed for many adults. As such, the ability to adjust expectations continued to be essential at SJMA through 2022-23. Our success in spite of challenges was thanks to the caring, go-forward approach of our teachers and volunteers, supported by a staff team with deep and growing roots at the music school and an enduring commitment to the well-being of the youth of this community.

With respect to our program delivery, our answer to this reality remains the same: to be as responsive as possible to the individual needs of each student and family, removing barriers to participation wherever possible, and finding creative ways of strengthening our collective sense of community and belonging.

Thirty new students joined SJMA in the fall, over the course of the year our student population fluctuated byvetween 135 and 111, and we did an additional winter intake of new enrollments. In September we introduced four new classes: Junior Woodwinds, Junior Recorder, Musicianship and Body Percussion, and for our winter intake a Novice Choir class was introduced along with Rhythm & Movement. In total our offerings for 2022-23 included 24 classes and disciplines, including Violin, Viola, Cello, Double Bass, Flute, Oboe, Clarinet, Bassoon, Trumpet, French Horn, Percussion, Junior Strings, Theory, Choir, Jazz, Marimba, Piano, and Music Therapy.

Our orchestral program, electives and choir learning generally takes place in small ensembles, but our Music Therapy program served a minimum of 14 Junior and Senior program students regularly on a 1-on-1 basis, with many more children receiving periodic support by music therapists.

Students in need were also provided additional 1-on-1 music lessons with skilled support staff.

Throughout the year, our students had enjoyed many diverse opportunities to perform. Our alumni trio performance at the Light Up Chinatown! Festival 2022, and our students performance at the Vancouver Community Arts Council 75th Anniversary Gala, and on stage again with Jay Malinowski of Bedouin Soundclash at the Music Heals Strike a Chord Gala at the Commodore Ballroom. SJMA alumni performed at Dr. Adele Diamond's conference "Joyous Celebration of Ideas, the Arts. Science, and Efforts to Make the World a Better Place", and our youngest students had a delightful experience performing at a garden concert followed by a pool party just for them, at the invitation of Jane McLennan, who is a great supporter of the Arts and dear friend to SIMA.

Our Christmas and Spring concerts once again brought the joy of being shoulder-to-shoulder to celebrate the gifts of community and accomplishments of our students. 2023 Graduates



and scholarship recipients were Teo Joya (Double Bass), Anne Yang (Flute) and Kin Joya (Percussion). Teo and Kin have already gone on to university and college, and Anne plans to do so next year. Additionally, Senior Program cello student Charles Mai was recognized for outstanding community service for being a wonderful role model to younger students. Charles received the Paul Myers Christmas Award, established in recognition of retiring SIMA staffer Paul's own outstanding contributions - ten years of capturing the beauty and heart of this place through the written word.

In addition to music being a means of caring for the children of our community, SJMA staff and teachers dreamed up many fun activities for connection and community building. To that end, there were bus trips to Crash Crawly's adventure gym, ice skating at Robson Square, community dinners and family nights that included teacher recitals to show our kids and parents what is possible with music.

The 2022-23 year was characterized by unparalleled

support by independent artists and arts organizations alike, providing our students with an incredibly broad range of educational experience with music: The VSO School of Music generously sponsored our brass and woodwinds sections and gave our students the chance to rehearse in the beautiful, purpose built Pyatt Hall. The Vancouver Recital Society brought our families to see the Kanneh-Mason family performance, Music In the Morning facilitated an intimate and exquisite performance of the Viano Quartet, and the Vancouver Chamber Choir welcomed our families to numerous of their performances. Through the generosity of the Chan Centre, our families experienced the exceptional music of Fatoumata Diawara and the Anderson and Row Piano duet. Friends Dave Vertesi of Hey Ocean!, Zach Grey of the Zolas, and Dan Moxon of Bend Sinister joined our students on stage during our concerts, as did renowned Canadian Jazz artist Jill Barber. SJMA had the opportunity to open our own doors to host a visiting student orchestra from Alberta, Bishop McNally High School.

All of us are deeply grateful to the many generous donors and community partners that make the music school possible. Not least among these are St James Anglican Church - our home and flagship location at Gore and Cordova, as well as St Paul's Roman Catholic Parish, where our Annex location is situated.

As I look forward to the 2023-24 program year that is already underway, I am profoundly grateful for the friendship and support of all those who continue to make the music school a reality.

Thank you for sharing our vision and commitment to the children here and for joining us in providing them with safety, creativity, expression and the means to grow in confidence and in joy through music.

I am happy to report that the Saint James Music Academy has emerged from the pandemic in a strong financial position as it continues to provide significant contributions to the many members of the Vancouver Downtown Eastside. Despite rising inflation and interest rates, the SJMA's amazing community of donors enabled us to maintain a high level of investment in our children. This past fiscal year saw our fundraising and development department build itself out and succeed in helping to first achieve and then exceed our planned budget. In the same context, I am proud to report that this past fiscal year our fundraising and administrative costs as a percentage of total costs were well below not-for-profit averages. This confirms that the SJMA dollars raised are being used appropriately and spent directly impacting the lives of the children in the SJMA community.

With the second year of full on-site operations post-pandemic, our staff, teachers, and volunteers worked diligently to ensure students continued to excel during their in-person classes. I witnessed the significant advancement of their orchestral commitment at both the Winter and Spring concerts – what a joy to see them all beam during their in-person performances. If you haven't been yet, I encourage you to attend this year.

As we wrap up the fiscal year, I want to once again remind our donors that we are looking for year over year continuity. Despite ending the fiscal year with a modest surplus, we need to continue to think of the long-term to ensure the continued success of the SJMA. We receive only about 10% of our total funding from government bodies, so we continue to rely heavily on individuals, businesses, and foundations in the community.

This past fiscal year, our overall funding was 9% greater than last fiscal year, and while we continue to focus on long-term sustainability for the SJMA, we are as always, so very thankful for the donations received –

I want to thank each and every one of you for partnering with the SJMA. Every donation makes an impact.





One of our most basic human needs is the need for food. It gives us life and it can give us so much more. It can give us joy, traditions, physical/mental/emotional wellbeing, and memories. On the flipside, as many parents know, the thought of food can bring up many stressors too. Stress that comes from financial challenges, nutritional worries (that picky eater that just won't try veggies!) and even the stress of what to make for breakfast, lunch, and dinner everyday! The SJMA family is fully aware of both the bliss and the struggles that come with the responsibility of providing food for children. Our Nutrition Program provides our students' families with some relief from the stress of feeding children and amplifies the joy of feeding children. This year alone we made over 200 meals per week equating to roughly 7,000 meals in our regular program year... over the years the numbers were higher so we are hundreds of thousands of meals we have provided for our community.

So this is just looking at what the Nutrition Program does on its most basic of levels but there is so much more that we are giving our students and their parents/caregivers. This year I have compiled a list of what we have learned about true nourishment from the SJMA Nutrition Program and want to share these tips:

 Always offer a variety of different vegetables and fruits.
 The more colour variations the better. You never know when you will discover a new love of something healthy!

- Eat together whenever possible.
 Creating connection time around meals is magic! Pass on old traditions and invent new traditions.
- Be a healthy eating role model.
 A positive attitude towards
 healthy food choices encourages
 those around us to do the same.
- Build community with food sharing. Whether it be learning about someone's culture through food, gathering people together in celebration, or whatever encourages togetherness.

Music Therapy Program, Kristen Shin







Thanks to the support from donors such as Music Heals, Saint James continued to provide music therapy services throughout the 2022-2023 school year. Music therapy sessions were available to both junior and senior students who could benefit from individualized support. These sessions were adapted to fit the needs and interests of each child. This included free musical exploration to help some kids find their own unique way of expressing themselves or processing their emotions, other sessions involved music composition and songwriting, and still others took the form of adapted music lessons which allowed students to find success in learning instruments at their own pace.

In 2022-23, SJMA employed two certified music therapists as well as a music therapy intern from Capilano College, which allowed us to expand our program to meet the needs of as many kids as possible. Many of the recipients of music therapy were able to showcase some of their accomplishments at our Christmas and Spring recitals. Having the opportunity to share their talents alongside their peers continues to be a highlight of the year for many of our kids.

The arrival of spring break marked the close of my role in the music therapy program, as I began maternity leave. I feel incredibly grateful to have been part of the wonderful team at SIMA for the past three years, as I was continuously inspired by the creative potential and resilience of our students. I am excited to introduce Chelsea Assaf as our new full time music therapist, along with Jenny Gilmour in the Senior Program and Melissa Huen in the Junior program. This next year at Saint James Music Academy will be filled with many wonderful experiences of discovery, connection, and growth through music!

Public School Outreach Program, Jillana Nickel





Music education has been shown to have clear benefits to the cognitive development of children and to improve academic performance. When cuts to music education in 2010 increased need for opportunities young people in the community to access high quality music education, Saint James' Music Academy launched its Outreach Program to provide music lessons in local public schools, at no cost to families or the schools. The Outreach Program helps to raise awareness about SJMA in the community as school staff and teachers refer students whom they feel would benefit from joining our core afterschool program, and it also allows large numbers of young people to access music lessons who would not otherwise have the chance.

The SJMA Outreach Program for 2022-23 taught by Jillana Nickel and was centered out of Seymour Elementary, reaching all seven of Seymour's K-7 classes via 6 hours of on-campus music classes. Over 140 students accessed 45 minute classes each week and participated in a wide variety of musical lessons, games, and activities. The curriculum focused on a basic introduction to music and used drums and percussion as a means of actively engaging the students in their learning. A typical class could include listening to and discussing songs, having a short lesson on musical theory or concepts, experiencing "show-and-tell" of a unique

instrument and having the chance to touch it or try it, short videos about various instruments, and group activities or games to musically apply what they learned in the lesson.

Although most of the students had little or no previous musical education, most showed significant receptivity and enthusiasm during class time. Many of the classroom teachers expressed surprise and delight at how engaged and excited their students were during this time, and were grateful to the Saint James Music Academy for this unique opportunity for their students to access music education with a trained music instructor.
